

RI President R. Gordon McInally



R. Gordon R. McInally is president of Rotary International. He was educated at the Royal High School in Edinburgh and at the University of Dundee, where he earned his graduate degree in dental surgery. Gordon joined Rotary in 1984 at age 26. A member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry, he has served as president and vice president of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland. He has also served RI as a director and on several committees, most recently as an adviser to the 2022 Houston Convention Committee and chair of the Operations Review Committee. "My vision is that Rotary should exist everywhere in a style to suit everyone who has the desire to be part of us and to help us do good in the world," he says.

RI President-Elect Stepanie Urchick



Stephanie Urchick is a member of the Rotary Club of McMurray, Pennsylvania, USA. She will serve RI as president in 2024-25. She has been an RI director and Rotary Foundation trustee. She has served RI in numerous capacities, including as training leader, regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, and RI president's representative. In addition, Stephanie was a representative and member-at-large to three sessions of the Council on Legislation. A Rotary member since 1991, Stephanie has participated in a variety of international service projects, including National Immunization Days in India and Nigeria. In Vietnam, she worked with clubs to help build a primary school and travelled to the Dominican Republic to install water filters.

A student of several Slavic languages, she has mentored new Rotary members in Ukraine and coordinated a Rotary Foundation grant for a mammography equipment and a biopsy unit for a Hospital in Poland. In its commemorative book, the Rotary Club of Krakow, Poland, noted Stephanie as a key figure for helping the re-birth of Rotary in post-Communist Poland.

Dr. Julie Brown



Dr. Brown currently serves as the Vice President of Advanced Learning at the Institute for Advanced Learning and Research in Danville, VA, a position she has held since 2013. She is responsible for providing high-quality talent development programs, aligned with economic development interests, which build the region's STEM capacity and talent pipeline. She has over twenty-five years of experience in education, working for a public research university, two community colleges, and regional K-12 districts. Dr. Brown received her baccalaureate degree from the University of Virginia, a Master's degree from Longwood University and a Ph.D. from

Old Dominion University. A graduate of the Sorensen Institute and Lead Virginia, Dr. Brown currently serves on numerous boards including the Center for Early Success, Sovah Health, the West Piedmont Workforce Development Board and the Danville Public Schools Education Foundation. Julie has been a Rotarian since 2003. She served as the Danville Riverview Rotary President in 2010, has chaired numerous committees, and hosted several GSE Team members. She is a multiple Paul Harris Fellow.

DGE Amelia J. Stansell



Amelia Stansell is the District Governor Nominee for District 7610, Past President of the Rotary Club of Warrenton, a mother and a business consultant.

Along with her Rotary Club of Warrenton, Amelia co-founded the Fauquier Anti Sex Trafficking Alliance (FASTA). The FASTA mission is "to inoculate our community through awareness and prevention education, and supporting survivors and their families when we fail. [They] are an alliance of community organizations, agencies and individuals working toward this common goal."

With FASTA members, she creates community awareness through a series of Community Conversations with partners such as Anti-Trafficking International, Reset 180, Fauquier County Sheriff's Office, Homeland Security Investigations and the FBI. These forums are held in schools and churches since 2018.

Amelia joined the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery after speaking at the 2019 Rotary International Convention in Hamburg, Germany and 2022 in Houston, TX and in Melbourne, Australia in 2023. She serves as the RAGAS State Coordinator for Virginia.
